Art Deco

The 1920s saw a number of new artistic styles and movements inspired by rapid industrialization and modern technology. Among them were cubism, Dadaism, and expressionism, which combined to produce Art Deco. This style uses ideas from the modern world and industry to create a linear appearance and smooth lines that make the art seem sleek and sophisticated. It features contrasting vivid colors and geometric and zigzag patterns. It became the dominant style in advertising and influenced fashion, design, and architecture.

European Exploration and Settlement

Exploration and Trade

As some land trade routes to the great riches of East Asia became less reliable and European powers sought other routes, especially by sea. The countries that eventually became Spain, France, the Netherlands, and England—competed in search of wealth and expansion. These countries hoped to broaden their trade networks, increase their profits, and find new territories. Their voyages west to find a water route to Asia led them to the Americas. Most European powers were also looking for other sources of **revenue** to military, and foreign operations. Realizing the potential of the Americas, they had begun to further explore and colonize the region.

By the mid-1600s, the four European powers had settlements in the Americas. Their settlement were similar in some ways, but their economic priorities and resources differed. Spain, the first to establish permanent colonies, mined for gold and silver in Mexico, Central America, and South America. Spain used these precious metals to pay off its debts in Europe and to purchase imports. France established a network of profitable trade routes to supply Europe's great demand for furs. French traders, with the French government, soon had a monopoly of the North American fur trade.

Like the other European powers, the Dutch colonization plan for the Americas was more for its government in Europe. Dutch merchants and traders established strong trade networks in the fur trade and built colonies in the Caribbean and South America. Dutch underfinancing doomed these Dutch colonies to failure and eventual takeover by other powers. England was also driven to colonize the Americas because of the potential profits to be made from the abundant raw resources. English colonies worked to develop profitable trade routes to Europe for the benefit of the English government. The English, like other European powers, viewed their colonies as sources of profit and raw resources to be monopolized.
